- Volunteer for NEAR or what was formerly Dinner at Your Door (now Meals on Wheels)
- Knit/ crochet a prayer shawl (or a mini- prayer shawl)
- Send a Thank you card to one of our frontline doctors or nurses on a Covid floor at North Memorial or Abbott (Bring to church on Sept 13)

A WORD FROM VICAR KRISTIN

Dear friends in Christ,

Thank you for a warm welcome into this wonderful congregation, even in these strange times. I am doing my best to learn your names, and they will come, but I'm finding that face masks make name recollection that much harder! I know you will give me grace over the coming weeks as I try. Needless to say, I'm finding the picture wall outside my office extremely helpful right now.

I am generally in the office on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and of course Sundays, and working from home on Wednesdays and Fridays. I am trying to keep Monday as my Sabbath day. I have set up a nice "corner" in our finished basement at home for my desk that is all mine. I consider it a huge coup as my husband is currently working out of the laundry room! I am certain many of you can relate to negotiating new schedules and spaces, and figuring out new ways of working and being together during the pandemic.

When I entered the process at the seminary to become an intern, I never imagined that my first interactions with you all would be primarily on-line or with masks and physical distancing in the parking lot. I expected to "be with you" in all the ways I was accustomed to: shaking hands after worship, swapping stories over coffee, meeting in small groups for Bible study, and maybe even accompanying younger members at camp.

Even as I confess to being disappointed that this way of "being together" is not for right now, I am reminded to be present, open to learning, and grateful for each moment at FLW. Beginning in September, I hope you will tune into an on-line meditation time with me on Facebook on Tuesday mornings, where I will be lighting a candle and sharing prayers that speak into uncertainty and ground us in God's presence.

I am reminded of a blessing written long ago by Julian of Norwich (1342-1416), a female Christian mystic, who was no stranger to pandemics, war, and other trials. She writes, in *To Greet a New Day:*

May I await this day – not as I hope,

expect, or imagine – but just as it is in the moment.

May I let this day come and be what it is, without meeting my expectation. May I accept it as a gift, whatever comes or does not come; accept that I am not in charge; accept the infinity of the Holy to be present whether or not I am aware. And may I attend to this day with actions the Holy invites me to take from this stance of openness.

A WORD FROM PASTOR PAM

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Weary. Wonder. These two words seem to have little in common with one another. And yet, I have been feeling and experiencing both of these since the beginning of the pandemic.

Like many of you, I'm weary of Covid19 and the destruction that this virus has caused on the whole world. And it is hard not to get discouraged – this virus is lasting much longer than any of us anticipated. I'm weary of seeing police brutality, gun violence, looting and destruction in the streets, floods, wildfires and arson. And if I'm weary – I can only imagine how others feel who have not been able to leave their homes or who have experienced police brutality or who have had their business looted or their park occupied or their house flooded or their community burned by wildfires or by arson. Our world is a mess.

And yet, I refuse to let my weariness with the world have the last word. Instead, I turn, and I invite you to turn, to "wonder." Wonder is a good thing to have for such a time as this – for this is a "liminal" time.

A liminal time is that time when we are not able to operate as we have in the past (pre-pandemic) and we are not yet to a time of "normalcy" (after the pandemic) but we are in a space and time that is "betwixt and between." The word "liminal" comes from the word limen – the threshold of the doorway. When you reach the doorway, you have to step over the threshold before you are in the new space. Think of the old tradition of brides being carried over the threshold of the doorway – it was a movement from an old way to a new way of living and being.

Liminal times, these "in-between" times when the old ways don't work, necessitate innovation and experimentation. At church, your staff has been busy experimenting and providing many different ways to help you worship. It has kept us really busy.

But I don't want to be so caught up in the busy-ness of experimenting that we miss this opportunity to wonder how God can use this time and us, God's people, to bring God's redemptive love to all people. Because as crazy as it may seem to us, God has done this before – in the midst of pandemics, famines, fires and war, God's love breaks through. And it will again. That's a promise. It's God's promise. As Paul writes, "there is nothing that can separate us – or our neighbor - from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

So let us wonder together and with God how we can share God's love with our neighbor (using Jesus' expansive definition of neighbor). Together, we can move from weariness to wonder to "WOW! That's what happens when we do God's work with our hands, hearts, lives. Let's do it!
