We arrived early to stake out our place on a field at the edge of a small town in Wyoming. They were ready for us. Even though it was only about ten in the morning, the local root beer stand was hopping. And, we were not the first. Lots of people had already gathered there and set out their lawn chairs and more were coming after us.

My family and I had traveled to a little town in nowhere, Wyoming to see the solar eclipse. But this little town was suddenly swarming with people because it was located along the narrow path of totality—where the moon covers the sun completely. We had our safety solar glasses. We had our chairs pointed in the right direction. We were ready.

There was a buzz in the air as we watched and waited, all anticipating the same thing. But there was no rushing the main event. As we got closer to the hour, the sky became dim like it does at twilight. The birds began their "end of the day" song. The crickets started chirping. The air felt a little cooler as the sun began to go behind the moon.

And then...Awe and wonder. That is what I felt as I sat and watched the sun disappear behind the moon, the red hot corona dancing along the edges. It was truly inspiring.

I imagine that it was deathly frightening to the people years ago who did not have advance warning that the sun was going to disappear for a few minutes. - How scary that would have been!

But for us, it was awe and wonder and then joy. As the Psalmist writes, "The whole earth is filled with awe at your wonders; where morning dawns, where evening fades, you call forth songs of joy! Psalm 65:8

PS I'm hooked on solar eclipses! I'll be traveling to Missouri on Sunday, April 7 (after church) to hopefully catch the next one. Unfortunately, there is no guarantee of good weather. If it is cloudy, we won't be able to see anything. But, after April 8, 2024, the next eclipse in the US will not happen for over 25 years. So keep your eyes peeled (safely) for the next eclipse and be filled with awe and wonder!

April (rain) showers bring May flowers, and I am already planning my spring planting, but April is also the month when songbirds begin returning from their winter vacation spots in the South to pair up and begin building nests; when hibernating animals wake up and hunt for food and mates; and when migrating butterflies, like monarchs, painted ladies, common buckeyes, red admirals, mourning cloaks, question marks, clouded sulphurs and some skipper species start making their way back north too. It's also the month in which we celebrate Earth Day and bless our animal friends. And guess what? I love animals of all shapes and sizes and species, just as much as I love wildflowers.

I have practically a whole ark's worth of pets at home. I have four birds (two that talk) two saltwater tanks full of fish and *invertebrates*, including starfish, snails, crabs, anemones and corals, an African frog, and a dog. Believe it or not, I've had many more pets at one time than this. I've also had lizards and snakes, mice, rabbits and squirrels, all in the house. I also have wild animals outdoors that I feed and often refer to as wild pets—a woodchuck that lives under my shed, a pocket gopher that I put in my yard (on purpose) and fed carrots as it started tunneling in my yard, as well as deer, tree frogs, squirrels and bunnies... I bought a bat house to hang in my yard this year, too.

In addition to companionship and love, my pets give me hope for humanity. You see, my pets get along. They play with each other, and even look out for one another, even though cats and dogs don't usually fight, and both will eat birds, and birds seldom trust cats and dogs—at least, that's how it is in the wild. But that's because animals in the wild have to compete for food and territory. But my pets know that they don't have to compete for food, or territory, or attention. As a result, they willingly share. My parrot drops food on the floor for the cat, and lets the dog lick his beak clean. The dog shares her bed with the cats, and the cats let the birds chase their tails and even perch on them. Even my fish look after each other, and the anemones too! That makes me think that, if we could somehow find a way to ensure that every human being has enough food, water, shelter and love—if we could figure out how to meet the needs of all people—then maybe... just maybe, humans could live together in peace, just like my pets do. Now, that's something to hope for—something worth striving for! That would be the prophecy of Isaiah (11:6-9) come true! That would truly be paradise.

In spring, as in faith, hope springs eternal, because Christ is risen, and that means anything is possible. Alleluia!



Our ripple effect extends beyond our day-to-day work to growing the Minnesota workforce and strengthening the economy. Small Sums' work is

- •Simple: We believe employment is a key factor in helping individuals experiencing homelessness become housed.
- •**Practical**: We know it doesn't take much to remove obstacles that can prevent a worker experiencing homelessness from taking a job. Something as practical as work clothes, shoes, and a bus pass is often all that is needed.
- •Powerful: We provide workers experiencing homelessness with what they need to begin working. Access to financial independence and security is a powerful catalyst for change.

When facing poverty and homelessness, securing commonly required gear, tools, and transportation to get to work can be an insurmountable barrier to starting employment. Small Sums' mission is to remove these barriers by providing required work items, a way to get to work, and additional services to help clients retain employment and achieve long-term economic and housing stability. When workers reach us, they have already found a verifiable job, a testament to their resilience and determination under daunting circumstances. Gainful employment is critical to stable living, and we encourage workers on this path!

Last year, Small Sums outfitted 1,178 workers with the work gear, tools, training, and transportation they needed to start and retain employment. This marks a noteworthy 30% increase from 2022 and nearly doubles the number of individuals served compared to 2021. With your help, we expect to serve even more this year. 
