


Pastoral Article

Light One Candle

In some traditions, the first candle in the Advent wreath is called the prophet candle. Often the prophets of the Old Testament stood alone as they prophesied against the darkness of our world and for the promise of hope. Notice how the light of a solitary candle can brighten up a dark room because the darkness cannot overpower even one candle. So light one candle in this first week of Advent. If you have an Advent wreath or Yule log, three or maybe four other candles are waiting for their turn. But for this first week, light only one candle. It is enough.

We light two candles the next week. They stand side by side in the Yule log my father made out of a birch tree limb many, many years ago. Together they can stamp out even more darkness – the kind that can



creep up on you in these long nights and short days. With so little sun peeking through the clouds and with continued news of the warring madness in Ukraine and violence on the streets that are too close to home, sometimes it sees as if the darkness is winning. I light two candles against that kind of darkness. The two candles keep each other company just as Mary and Joseph did on their long journey to Bethlehem. Some traditions call the long journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem.

Lighting three candles the next week brings me both a gladness that we are more than half way through Advent – and also a sense of alarm. Christmas is coming and I'm not ready! But I'm never "ready" and yet... Christmas will come whether I get all of the "stuff" done on my ever-lengthening "to do" list... or not. This candle is often called "the Shepherd's candle." The word for this day is "Joy!" This week, as we light three candles, my goal will be to let joy – and not anxiety—prevail in my thinking and in my daily life.

When the fourth candle blazes, the wreath is full of light. This candle is sometimes called the Angel's candle, reminding us of the shining light of hope, wonder, joy and peace that came with their proclamation of the Good News on that first Christmas night. This year, the fourth Sunday of Advent falls a full week before Christmas day. The light from the Advent wreath seems bright and yet outside, the world is increasingly dark. This year, the longest night is on December 21 and our Advent midweek will take time to remember and to sit with the darkness of pain and grief that so many feel at this time of year as we remember who isn't with us this year to celebrate. We will light even more candles against the darkness, and let the peace that the angels proclaim be a balm against our pain.

Finally on Christmas eve, we will light the Christ candle – the candle for the one who IS the Light of the World. And then, from the Christ candle, we will light candle after another as we sing Silent Night. On this night, we remember that the light of Christ banishes all evil and replaces that kind of darkness with light and love. We also remember our role in lighting the candle of our neighbor, sharing the light of Christ with one another.

May the light of Christ be with you,

Reflections on Advent

When I was a child I failed to understand the importance of Advent. In my mind Advent was simply the Church's "Christmas Countdown"--as if I wasn't already counting down the days until Christmas! The Advent season always felt slow to me as we talked week after week about baby Jesus who took four long weeks to be born. Why couldn't we just skip the waiting and the labor pains and jump ahead to the joy of Christmas morning?

Now that I am older I have come to appreciate the season of Advent. Advent marks the beginning of the new church year, and it helps us as Christians to slow down and reflect on the significance of Jesus entering into our lives. Going to church week after week we hear stories about Jesus and about God's love, and I think we can become so accustomed to the Good News that we lose the miracle and mystery of it all. Advent gives us the opportunity to rediscover and re-experience with awe God's love for each one of us.

Think about it...the impenetrable God of the universe who created the earth and everything in it, allowed God's Self to become human-and not only to be human but to be born in the most vulnerable form, a tiny baby who would be born in a dirty stable instead of a palace. God did this for no other reason than out of complete and absolute love. God wanted to be in relationship with humanity, with each and every one of us, and became human himself in order to make that relationship possible. Through this miraculous and unexpected act, the course was set for all of humanity to be saved through the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus. How can we not be in awe of this wonderful and freely given gift?

But before we can experience the joy of Jesus's birth, we must first wait and experience the labor pains of Advent. During Advent we remember that there is sin and brokenness in our world. There is a reason Jesus needed to save us and we are all in need of a Savior. During Advent we prepare our hearts and humble ourselves to receive God's gifts, and we wait with longing and hope that God will keep God's promises to finish the work that began with the birth of Jesus.

In Christ we place our hope. We give thanks for what God has already done, and we look forward to the day when Christ will return to reconcile all things. May you have a blessed Advent journey as you remember the true reason for Christmas-Emmanuel, God is with us!
