

#### Pastoral Article

This past month, my husband and I went on a "camino" with eight close friends of ours from college. Camino simply means "walk" in Spanish. But the term has come to refer to not just any walk, but a pilgrim walk to a holy site. The destination in Spain is the cathedral in Santiago built in honor of St. James, Jesus' disciple.

People have been going on this Camino for hundreds of years. The traditional "Camino de Santiago" follows a path from France across Spain to Santiago. But there are "camino" paths from many directions. We took the path from Portugal. The path is well marked with signs like these:



This shell is the symbol of the Camino de Santiago journey - many of the pilgrims who walk the path wear this shell or attach it to their backpack. Not only is this scalloped shell a common seafood in Spain, but medieval pilgrims would use this shell when they went to churches that were handing out food for pilgrims - this was the portion that they would receive.

This shell is also a symbol of baptism and this was what I thought about on my journey. As I walked this path for over 100 kilometers - 70 miles - with friends, we had many and long conversations - some of them just "catching up" and some of them "deeper" and more reflective of our pilgrim journey.

As I walked and talked, I became more and more grateful. I am grateful for this time, for the world God has made and I am grateful for you and all the people in my life. In a time in which the world around us seems ever more challenging, it is good to take the time to simply reflect on the gifts that God has given us - gifts of time, gifts of companions for our journey and the gift of Jesus Christ, our Savior.

At the end of our journey, we celebrated communion on a church hilltop not far from the city as the sun rose. And then we joined the hundreds of pilgrims in Santiago for the "Pilgrim's mass." We got there a ½ hour early, but there was standing room only. At the end of the service, eight clergymen took huge ropes and brought down from the ceiling a "Bota fumado," a huge silver incense container on ropes. The filled the container with incense, lit it and after a prayer, they hoisted the fumado into the air and swung it over the heads of those in the cathedral while the organ played an phenomenal oratory. It was a sight to see, to smell and to hear!



It was an incredible journey - but it wasn't quite done. The next day we took a journey to "Fistere" - Also called "finisteria." This is the farthest known point to the west in New Testament times and the place where James supposedly preached when he went to preach "to the ends of the earth." I couldn't help proclaiming a word of scriptures too.

Pastor Pam at the Finistere - the end of the earth proclaiming: "This is the day that the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it!" Psalm 118:24 As I reflect back on this time away, it made me realize once again how grateful I am for the gifts of God - the gift of baptism into the family of God, the gift of God's beautiful creation and the gift of you, my family in Christ. Thanks be to God!

When I was a little girl I was very passionate about animals. So much so, in fact, that I was certain I would grow up to be an "animal police officer." I had a conversation about this the other day with my boyfriend, Derek. We were at Walmart and I was telling him how excited I was to donate toys for Christmas. That is my favorite part of the holiday season because it brings me joy to think about a child opening a present on Christmas morning. Derek agreed that donating toys was a great thing to do, but for him he is more passionate about donating food and supporting food pantries. Both causes are important. We want families to be fed and we want children to smile with a gift. But you know what? There are people passionate about other causes to help in other ways too. There are the people who work to provide safe housing, people who donate or knit winter clothing, people who provide access to medical care, or work to provide access to education and fair employment opportunities. The list goes on.

The point is, we all have different causes that we are passionate about, and we all can find ways both big and small to play our part. So as we enter into the Thanksgiving and Christmas season, I encourage you to take some time to reflect on some of the causes that you are passionate about. How might you be able to help do this important work in the world? Thanks be to God for our many passions!


#### Join Us For Book Club!

This month our daytime and evening book clubs will be reading *The Sun Does Shine*, a memoir by Anthony Ray Hinton.

"In 1985, Anthony Ray Hinton was arrested and charged with two counts of capital murder in Alabama. Stunned, confused, and only twenty-nine years old, Hinton knew that it was a case of mistaken identity and believed that the truth would prove his innocence and ultimately set him free. It was difficult, but as Hinton realized and accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive, but find a way to live on Death Row. For the next twenty -seven years he was a beacon—transforming not only his own spirit, but those of his fellow inmates, fifty-four of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. With the help of civil rights attorney and bestselling author of *Just Mercy*, Bryan Stevenson, Hinton won his release in 2015.


