

Parking Lot Worship Bring your furry, feathery, or finny



Pastor's Article

Just before school started, a mother shared with me an exchange she had with her Kindergarten-to-be daughter:

Daughter: "I've decided. I'm not going to go to Kindergarten after all." Mother: "Why not? I thought you were excited to get to go to school." Daughter: "Why should I go? I don't think I need to learn anything more." The mother told me that it was all that she could do to not laugh after this exchange. Of course, the little girl did start school this year... and she is thriving.

Trying something new is always a risk. But it also presents an opportunity. Here are some FAQ (frequently asked questions):

- How is this new learning community different from what we have done in the past? This program is being run by the Minneapolis Area Synod, in conjunction with Augsburg University and is funded by a grant through the Lilly Endowment which is interested in helping congregations thrive. We will be in a cohort with other Wildfire congregations – Cross of Glory, First Lutheran, and Holy Nativity and with Christ Memorial in Plymouth.
- · Why are we doing this? What is our goal?

 Our big goal is to learn and teach faith practices that help us to tell our story and God's story in our everyday lives and to practice what it means to be a good neighbor.
- · Who is going to be on the FLW Faith-Practices and Neighboring Practices team?

 Four of our members: Sue Ferkingstand, Rory Joygaard, Heather Lane, and Tommy

 Thompson have joined Vicar Kyle Anderson and myself as the FLW team
- *How much does it cost?*The financial costs are completely paid for by the grant.
- · What does this mean fo<mark>r the c</mark>ongregation?

You, as a congregation, are asked to pray for the team, the cohort and the congregation. The team will be learning and then teaching two "keystone habits", one-to-ones and intentional prayer. These practices will ground us in our learning throughout the two years and help us to discern where God is at work both within our congregation and our surrounding community.

You, as a congregation, are asked to help the team listen for how God is calling us to grow in faith, be open to learning and trying new faith practices and neighboring practices so that we can share God's Good News with our neighbor.

In some ways, it is nothing new. Jesus called us to love God and love our neighbor. I am hopeful that engaging in Faith-Practices, Neighboring Practices with the Synod may challenge us, equip us and inspire us to live out the mission that God has for us in our neighborhoods and in our lives.

But it involves a risk. We may be made a little uncomfortable by some of the ideas and questions presented. At times you may be out of your comfort zone. But as Nick Tangen, director of Faith Practices and Neighboring Practices, says, "One community's faith practices and neighboring practices will not look the same as the congregation next door." Each congregation is a distinct community with their own gifts, talents and challenges. And yet, one of the benefits of being a part of a cohort of congregations, is that we will be able to learn together and from one another's experiences.

Together we will be exploring new ways to pray, to engage God's story and to listen to our neighbors. We - the team, the cohort, and the whole congregation --will be encouraged to ask questions, to wonder and to pray about where God is leading us and how we can authentically practice our faith and be the neighbors that Christ asks us to be.

As part of our Faith Practices/ Neighboring Practices cohort, you will be invited to try some new faith practices. Here's one way to pray – using a journal or notebook. Write:

P – Praise and thank:

- + Start with an adjective of praise: Awesome, Mighty, Wonderful
- + Add one of the ways we think about God: God/ C Creator/ Redeemer/ Son of God/ Spirit
- + Add a sentence or two of things/people/ experiences for whom you are thankful. Thank you God for...
- **R** Repent: saying sorry for things you/ we have done or left undone.
- A Ask for everything that you need/worry about/ hope for/ dream for
- **Y** Yes. We pray that it may be so.

According to UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres the recently released Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report was nothing less than a "code red for humanity." The need for immediate action is clear. As a Christian community how do we faithfully respond to this crisis?

Humans are unique creatures. In Psalm 8 the psalmist proclaims that humans have been given dominion over God's creation and that God has put all things under our control. For far too long we have misused our powers and we have exploited our natural environment. Texts like Philippians 2:7 attest that living in the way of Christ is to live as a servant leader. The natural world is crying out in distress and now is the time for us to act as advocates for all of creation and to protect the environment which God has entrusted to us.

The news is definitely dire but as Christians we live in hope. God has a way of providing salvation in unlikely circumstances going all the way back to the deliverance of the Israelites at the Red Sea. Our seemingly small actions like driving and flying less, eating less meat, and using less plastic add up and do make a difference. As a Christian who lives in the promise of the Resurrection I have hope that our small actions will inspire the larger actions that are required to live sustainably and in harmony with the earth.

Our October 3 worship service will involve a blessing of the animals and this will be a time to give thanks for God's creation. Our adult education hour on that day will include a discussion of the ELCA's social statement Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice. The social statement is available on the ELCA's website and I invite you all to read it. Wildfire Community Voices Event with Senate District 45 State Legislators

On Tuesday evening, September 21, Faith-Lilac Way hosted a forum with the state legislators representing Senate District 45. The forum had a live audience and was also livestreamed on the Wildfire Facebook page. The participating legislators were State Senator Ann Rest of New Hope, State Representative Cedrick Frazier of New Hope from District 45A, and State Representative Mike Freiberg of Golden Valley from District 45B.





The legislators each made an opening statement where they

discussed what they think are the most serious challenges facing our community and what gives them hope for our community. The legislators addressed a wide variety of issues including COVID-19, affordable housing, multi-modal transportation, racial inequities, climate change, and voting rights. All of the legislators said that they were optimistic about the future because of the children in our community.

Each legislator then talked about how individuals and congregations can help create solutions. The legislators emphasized that churches are valuable in building community. They recognized that churches are essential for helping those who need charitable assistance. In addition, the legislators acknowledged that the church can be a powerful voice in helping to shape public policy.

After their presentations the legislators answered questions which were submitted by audience members. The questions presented gave the legislators an opportunity to talk about additional topics including bonuses for frontline workers, education, college affordability, redistricting, and police reform.

This event was a great opportunity to interact with our elected officials about issues that are very important to our community. We thank our legislators for participating in this event and we also thank all community members who participated both in person and online.



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
