Dear friends in Christ,

What brings you joy?

I feel joy when I walk in my neighborhood, noticing which flowers are blooming. I feel joy when I see someone from church that I haven't seen throughout the pandemic. I feel joyful when we sing God's praises in church. And, I feel joy when I give.

I didn't always feel that way. When I was twenty something I went on a retreat and one of the talks was "The Joy of Giving." I was skeptical. Was this the "catch" at the end of a wonderful retreat? Was I going to have to submit to an arm-twisting financial appeal? I had very little disposable income at this time and wasn't about to give what little I had away. So, when it came time to listen to this talk, my armor was up.

But it wasn't an appeal for "my" money. Instead, a woman told about her own transformation in the way that she understood money and all the gifts that God had given to her. She wasn't asking me for "my" money at all. Instead, she was telling about the joy that she felt when she was able to give out of the resources that God had entrusted to her. She talked about the joy of giving. I appreciated her talk, but I didn't really understand it until I was at a child's birthday party. Have you ever watched a little child opening a gift? It's so much fun to see the joy and the surprise of a child as he or she tears open a present. And this time was no exception. I remember it vividly because when he opened the gift, he exclaimed, "Just what I've always wanted!" He was three. I don't remember what the gift was - a toy of some sort. His joy was overflowing. And that was wonderful. But what struck me was not his joy, but rather the face of the giver of that gift – it radiated with joy. This person was filled with the joy of giving.

It gives us joy to give because when we give freely of the time, talents and resources that God has entrusted to us, we are sharing a piece of who we are. We are sharing what God has given us. And when we do this, God says to us, "Just what I always wanted!"


This month in October we will begin to talk about "Living Faith." We will learn more about how our faith transforms us as well as how we live out our faith actively in life and the world around us.



Dinner With Edward By Isabel Vincent

Stewardship and Living Faith

Fall is the season in which we as the Church talk about stewardship. Oftentimes when we hear the word "stewardship" we automatically think about money. We ask ourselves questions such as, Am I giving enough money to the church? Can I afford to give more? It is true that finances are an important part of our stewardship conversation as we think about our resources and the missions we hope to accomplish. At the same time, though, finances are only one part of stewardship.

So what else is stewardship? In short, stewardship is the way in which we recognize with thanksgiving all of the blessings in which God has given us-our time, talents, finances and possessions-and we think about how we can use these resources to glorify God and serve the neighbor. Said in another way, stewardship is well-rounded and encompasses all areas of our lives, it is a lifestyle-it is *Living Faith*.

As Christians, we are called to live out our faith and to share the Good News of Christ's love with others. When we find ways to do these things we are doing stewardship! Faith is not passive but it instead motivates us to use our resources and our very selves to serve God and neighbor.

Stewardship is the opportunity for us to join in relationship with God and to thank God for all that God has first done for us and continues to do. So as we enter our stewardship season this month, take some time to reflect on the many gifts, talents and resources God has given you, and how might God be calling you to partner with God in mission this next year.


