
Words of Institution

Eat This Bread

Eat this bread, drink this cup, come to me and never be hungry. Eat this bread, drink this cup, trust in me and you will not thirst. (sing 2x) Thee we adore, O Savior, God most true, thy glory clothed in bread and wine anew; our hearts to thee in true devotion bow, in humble awe, we hail thy presence now.

O true remembrance of Christ crucified, the bread of life to us for whom he died; lend us this life then; feed and feast our mind, be thou the sweetness we were meant to find.

Fountain of goodness, Jesus, Lord and God, cleanse us, O Christ, with thy most cleansing blood: increase our faith and love, that we may know the hope and peace which from thy presence flow.

Jesus, by faith we see thee here below; send us, we pray thee, what we thirst for so: someday to gaze upon thy face in light, blest evermore with thy full glory's sight. Amen.

Prayer After Communion

Lord Jesus, in a wonderful sacrament you strengthen us with the saving power of your suffering, death, and resurrection. May this sacrament of your body and blood so work in us that the fruits of your redemption will show forth in the way we live. Amen.

The Holy Gospel John 13:1-17, 33-35 (NRSV)

Jesus practices what he teaches and preaches. Foot washing was a common act of hospitality in a land of desert dust, providing relief and care to guests. It was a menial job done by servants. Jesus surprises his disciples by washing their feet and commanding them to love one another as he has loved them.

The Gospel according to John, the thirteenth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand."

Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the

feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

The Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Invitation to wash your neighbor's hands and receive a blessing

Foot-washing was the tangible act of love that Jesus demonstrated as an example of how to exhibit love within the church community as a way of fulfilling his new commandment that we love one another as he loves us. Since we do not live in a desert environment, nor is walking our primary means of travel, today we wash each other's hands, both as an act of communal love, and as preparation for ministry, since we are the hands and feet of Christ in this world.

Gospel John 18:1-11 (NRSV)

The Kidron Valley is not much more than a ditch just outside the East wall of Jerusalem. The garden of Gethsemane is just a short walk up the Mount of Olives, East of the Temple. It is where Jesus goes, with his disciples after the Passover Meal. In the Gospel of John, Jesus does not pray for relief but boldly accepts his mission.

The Gospel according to John, the eighteenth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

After Jesus had spoken these words, he went out with his disciples across the Kidron valley to a place where there was a garden, which he and his disciples entered. Now Judas, who betrayed him, also knew the place, because Jesus often met there with his disciples. So Judas

brought a detachment of soldiers together with police from the chief priests and the Pharisees, and they came there with lanterns and torches and weapons. Then Jesus, knowing all that was to happen to him, came forward and asked them, "Whom are you looking for?" They answered, "Jesus of Nazareth." Jesus replied, "I am he." Judas, who betrayed him, was standing with them. When Jesus said to them, "I am he," they stepped back and fell to the ground. Again he asked them, "Whom are you looking for?" And they said, "Jesus of Nazareth." Jesus answered, "I told you that I am he. So if you are looking for me, let these men go." This was to fulfill the word that he had spoken, "I did not lose a single one of those whom you gave me." Then Simon Peter, who had a sword, drew it, struck the high priest's slave, and cut off his right ear. The slave's name was Malchus. Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword back into its sheath. Am I not to drink the cup that the Father has given me?"
